Pre-Medical Education (4 - 5 Years)

- Undergraduate degree required (any major)
- Pre-requisite courses in science required for medical school and MCAT preparation
- Build GPA to demonstrate acumen in graduate level courses
- Gain experience:
 - Clinical exposure
 - Volunteering (medical and community)
 - Research

Degrees & Certificates Guide

AS - An Associate of Science degree is a two-year degree that combines general coursework with major-specific classes.

AAS - An Associate of Applied Science degree is a two-year college degree that focuses on a specific technical skill of applied science.

Certificate - A certificate of study is a postsecondary credential that shows completed practical training and gained skills in a specific field and carries credit.

Career Studies Certificate - A careers studies program is a short-term program that improves job skills (12-18 academic credits, 15-18 months to complete).

FastForward - FastForward is a short-term workforce training program that offers industry credentials and certifications in a shorter time period (non-credit).
